Our mission is to help people in need, promote self-sufficiency and, where possible, enable the recipients to pass their benefit on to others.

Highlighted below are just some of the projects that have met real needs and changed the lives of people and communities in 2010. Thank you for helping us to make this difference!

Developing Nations Scholarship Fund

Perennially, scholarships continue to be the mainstay of LifeNets work. In 2010 about 50 students were supported by our fund. The cost per individual varies, but the average cost per student is about \$1,500 each year. Scholarships recipients are varied; they can be seeking a four or five year college degree, a one year certification, a vocational degree or finishing secondary school.

We serve people in the following countries: Malawi, Zambia, Zimbabwe, South Africa, Ghana, Ukraine, Armenia, Philippines, Several students will be graduating, and we are very hopeful that your investment in them will produce results in jobs and income. In impoverished families it is expected that the one with an income will help to support other family members so that many can benefit from the education of one.

Our star graduate from the past year is Cephas Chapamba who received a degree in clinical medicine. Chephas writes: "This will benefit me a lot in the sense that my salary with the government will rise, my responsibility at work will rise, my chance of expanding my business has increased to almost 100%, above all the community I am saving will stop travelling long distances in search of medical services since they have one right in their community. Is this not wonderful?"

We also thank those who donate money to the cause, as not all wheelchairs donated are in working condition. Some need batteries or other minor repairs.

Opening of Oasis of LifeNets Nursery School July 7, 2010

In 2006 LifeNets considered a project proposal by a husband-wife team of Howard and Ruth Elia. Both are schoolteachers who had a dream to build and operate a nursery school in a busy area of Lilongwe, the capital city of Malawi. When this building is fully completed, it will accommodate 100 nursery school children age three to five years old. The school will be self-sustaining. It opened on July 7, 2010 as their dream and a community need is being fulfilled.



New Cattle Project in Kenya



LifeNets is exporting the success of the ten-year old experience in Zambia to Kenya and Zimbabwe. Leaders from both those countries travelled to Zambia in April 2010 to learn about how we have helped communities achieve food security and a higher standard of living. To date, nine families in Kenya have benefited from the heifer project and there are some funds left to purchase another quality heifer for one other family member. The families who have already received the heifers are already feeling very blessed and happy. They have continued enjoying milk for food from the heifers, and they have excess milk to sell and pay for their basic needs including sugar, salt, cooking fat, oil, paraffin, and school supplies for their children. The cow dung is also being used to fertilize their garden plots.

Special Events Fundraisers

Four Special Events were held in 2010 to raise money for various LifeNets Activities. We are ever grateful for the money raised at the Seattle Rotary Skyline club for the JohJan school construction, express deep appreciation for major fundraisers in Seattle, Fort Worth, Piscataway and North Dakota that raised money for our scholarship, water and orphan care programs.




