# Developing Nations Scholarship Fund

The Developing Nations Scholarship Fund is transforming the lives of young people in developing countries around the world who will have an advantage as they enter the labor market: they will have an education and a degree in their own country that will help them with gainful employment. LifeNets has served students in the following countries:

- Chile
- El Salvador
- Guatemala
- Malawi
- Mexico
- Moldova
- Peru
- South Africa
- Zambia
- Zimbabwe

The average cost of tuition to attend University for a year in developing countries is \$850 per student. LifeNets 2007 scholarship program is budgeted at \$55,000. This may pay for only two or three college educations in the United States, but in our chosen developing areas it pays for about 65 students. LifeNets has provided well over \$120,000 in scholarships since 2002.
