The report seeks to identify improvements to address the challenges and failings. For example, due to poor rains, some brethren will have little to no food. Late planting or type of maize could have affected the poor results.

However the results, LifeNets has been able to reach out to aid sustainability to the remotest part of Zambia, giving clean water to the poor villagers who could not afford to sink a borehole and giving food to the needy. This is only done by people who have love and charity in their hearts.

They look healthy and were not affected by diseases which hit their area, because LifeNets bought animal drugs for dipping, deworming and vaccination.

The cows are giving him about 2.5 litres of milk per day.

Mr. David Shimwambwa in the field which LifeNets had provided seed and fertilizers, to improve his life.


Hopefully he will have a good yield to sustain his livelihood (him and his family).

Mr. Kabachi also benefited from LifeNets seed and fertilizers, he will have something to feed him and his grandchildren.





82 years old Mr. and Mrs. Namukombo in the field of maize donated by LifeNets. They will have something to sustain their well being this year.

Connie gave birth to a female calf, a privilege is given to the donors that raised the funds, to name the calf.



Daisy is looking so healthy, but has not been picked from Shea farm. The owner still wants to prepare a place for her. Daisy is also pregnant.

Conclusion

LifeNets has been providing various services to people in the remote areas of Zambia. Many people have benefited from these services. For example, LifeNets provides drugs for people who have no access to health centres as they are very far. Among other things, LifeNets has donated animals and drugs to help with maintenance and giving people loans for fertilizers and seed to help them in this years farming season.

LifeNets is reaching out to many people by providing safe and clean water. just last year, LifeNets sunk a borehole in Nalubanda that benefited over 400 people and so yet to sink another one in Namukombo village. The sinking will be done early in May when it is dry. The roads in some remote areas during the rain season are impassable and that's the more reason why some areas were not visited.

A visit to some of the areas is evidence to what LifeNets is doing. From the photos, one would tell that many people's lives have been improved tremendously.

During harvest time, these areas will be visited again to determine their yields.

All these people are thanking LifeNets for the good works its doing in their lives.
